Sexagesima Sunday

GOSPEL Luke 8:4-15

At that time, when a very great crowd was gathered together and hastened out of the cities, unto Him, He spoke by a similitude. "The sower went out to sow his seed. And as he sowed, some fell by the wayside. And it was trodden down: and the fowls of the air devoured it. And other seed fell upon a rock. And as soon as it was sprung up, it withered away, because it had no moisture. And other seed fell among thorns. And the thorns growing up with it, choked it. And other seed fell upon good ground and being sprung up, yielded fruit a hundredfold." Saying these things, He cried out: "He that hath ears to hear, let him hear."

And His disciples asked Him what this parable might be. To whom He said: "To you it is given to know the mystery of the kingdom of God; but to the rest in parables, that 'seeing they may not see and hearing may not understand.' Now the parable is this: The seed is the word of God. And they by the wayside are they that hear: then the devil comes and takes the word out of their heart, lest believing they should be saved. Now they upon the rock are they who when they hear receive the word with joy: and these have no roots: for they believe for a while and in time of temptation they fall away. And that which fell among thorns are they who have heard and going their way, are choked with the cares and riches and pleasures of this life and yield no fruit. But that on the good ground are they who in a good and perfect heart, hearing the word, keep it and bring forth fruit in patience."



Valentine of Terni, officially Saint Valentine of Rome, born 226 AD was a widely recognized 3rd-century Roman saint and since the High Middle Ages is associated with a tradition of courtly love.

He was a Roman Priest at a time when emperor Claudias was persecuting the church. Claudias issued an edict that prohibited the marriage of young people. This was based on the hypothesis that unmarried soldiers fought better than married soldiers because married soldiers might be afraid of what might happen to them or their wives or families if they died.

This edict immediately presented a problem to the Christian church. The idea of encouraging young people to marry within the Christian church was what Saint Valentine was about. And he secretly married them because of the edict.

Saint Valentine was eventually caught, imprisoned and tortured for performing marriage ceremonies against the command of Emperor Claudius. There are legends surrounding Saint Valentine's actions while in prison.

One of the men who was to judge him in line with the Roman law at the time was called Asterius, whose daughter was blind. Saint Valentine was supposed to have prayed with and healed the young girl with such astonishing effect that Asterius himself became Christian as a result.

In the year 269 AD, on February 14th, Saint Valentine was sentenced to a three-part execution of a beating, stoning, and finally decapitation all because of his stand for Christian marriage. The story goes that the last words he wrote were in a note to Asterius' daughter. He inspired today's romantic missives by signing it, "from your Valentine."

The relics of Saint Valentine were kept in the Church and Catacombs of San Valentino in Rome, which remained an important pilgrim site throughout the Middle Ages until the relics were transferred to the church of Santa Prassede. The flower-crowned skull of Saint Valentine is exhibited in the Basilica of Santa Maria in Cosmedin, Rome; other relics were brought to Whitefriar Street Carmelite Church in Dublin, Ireland where they remain to this day.

Saint Valentine has come to be known as the patron saint of lovers. If he were here today, he would say to married couples – "there comes a time where you're going to have to suffer. It's not going to be easy to maintain your commitment and your vows in marriage. Don't be surprised if the 'gushing' love that you have for someone changes to something less "gushing" but maybe much more mature."

THE SEVEN SACRAMENTS

It is important that you know whether you have Sanctifying Grace in your soul or not. It is something you cannot afford to be uncertain about. A religious feeling does not indicate the presence of Sanctifying Grace in the soul. Therefore, Jesus Christ had to give us some signs which would indicate that Grace is going into the soul. He had to give us signs that we could see, feel, hear or experience with some of the five senses. He gave us seven such signs by which we could know that we are receiving Grace. These signs are the seven Sacraments.

It is critically important that we remember the sacraments are not traditions. They are not little rituals we play out like the make-believe games of childhood. They have the power to bring heaven to earth, rip the veil between all things seen and unseen, and allow humanity and eternity to commingle in mysterious, yet palpable ways. Through the sacraments, heaven comes, not just to visit, but to live with us and in us. In the sacraments, we are graced.

Living a sacramental life is the great gift and calling of every Catholic, and we sometimes forget just how powerful and healing that is.

Learning the history of how a particular sacrament developed is a useful way to reignite our respect for its practice. For example, the rite of ordination, from apostolic times, teaches us that the prayers of consecration combined with the laying on of hands affects the Sacrament of Holy Orders. Here, when the bishop calls upon the Holy Ghost, an indelible spiritual mark impresses upon the soul of a man and he becomes typos tou Patros, the living image of God the Father. Here, he is graced for the duties of his vocation. Here, he becomes a priest forever.

It is particularly important for us to teach children that sacraments are so much more than a ceremony to prepare for; they are God’s way of reaching down to us and offering us a lifelong gift—a gift of grace that gives us a glimpse of heaven and a taste of eternity.

Baptism - Through Baptism, our sins are washed away, Sanctifying Grace first enters our soul, and we are able to receive the other Sacraments.

Penance - We should repeatedly use the Sacrament of Penance to ask Our Lord for forgiveness, and to receive the extra graces we need to resist temptation.

Holy Eucharist - The Holy Eucharist is the Sacrament in which Jesus Christ is physically present under the appearances of bread and wine.

Confirmation - Confirmation strengthens our commitment to be loyal followers of Jesus Christ. Soldiers of God.


Holy Orders - Through Holy Orders, men receive the powers of the Catholic Priesthood.
