

NEW TRADITIONAL PRIESTS TO FILL THE VOID AS ROME CANCELS THE MASS

ORDINATION TO THE PRIESTHOOD
JUNE 29TH, 2022



The big news is the ordination of four new priests at Most Holy Trinity Seminary. The four new priests will be of great service. Two will stay with the seminary and two will be attached to the parish and school. It appears that there will be about twenty seminarians in the fall. It is possible that a few others will join during the summer. We have never had TWENTY seminarians. Not even close. It is heartening to see the enthusiasm among the youth for what will be a difficult and sacrificial priesthood. God is moving them, and they have not resisted.

A few minor changes have been made in the program. There are still seven years of study, but the first year will include teaching the students various skills for their years of philosophy and theology. Principal among these is a course in English grammar. Many, if not most, come into our seminary without the slightest knowledge of grammar. When they are thrown directly into Latin, they struggle. Latin is an extremely grammatical language, far more than English. They will also be taught some etiquette, as many know little about good manners. They also need to be cured of bad speech habits, learned in adolescence. For example, there is the excessive use of the word "like". It is presently used to mean "said". So, "I'm like" now means "I said". Young people tend to pepper their whole conversation with "I'm like." Another dreadful custom is the term "you guys" to mean the plural of "you". This is all thanks to the current schooling and lack of proper teaching. Clergy need to be dignified in their conduct. It pertains to their exalted state. Part of this dignity is the manner in which they speak.

Our new seminarians will be drawn from Florida, Virginia, Illinois, Ohio, Ontario, and Wisconsin. One of these is a Jesuit Novus Ordo priest who desires to quit the New Religion and regain his Roman Catholicism. There is yet another Novus Ordo priest who has shown some interest. And, further good news, the Sisters of Saint Thomas Aquinas must expand their convent facilities, since they are receiving more vocations than they have room for.

Worshippers Furious as Cardinal Bans Nearly all Latin Masses in Washington DC

In a move Friday that left traditional Roman Catholics in the District of Columbia stunned and very heartbroken, Cardinal Wilton Gregory ordered a ban on nearly all of the Masses celebrated in the traditional Latin Rite that was the church's normal way of worship prior to 1970.

Gregory's move was the latest assault on worship and books that preceded the church's Second Vatican Council of 1962-65.

Coming on the heels of the recent move by Cardinal Blase Cupich of Chicago to end all Latin Masses in his diocese beginning August 1, Gregory's decision is seen as part of a wide-ranging plan crafted by Pope Francis and executed by liberal allies in the church hierarchy to wipe out any avenue for worship in the manner Catholics did for 500 years before Vatican II.
